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President's Message

The Illinois Supreme Court unan-
imously declared that the "pension theft"
legislation commonly known as SB 1 was
unconstitutional. This was a great victory
for public employees and retirees in Chi-
cago and across the State of Illinois,
however Governor Rauner seems to
think that diminishing retirement benefits
is just fine. Apparently, he hasn't read
the decision because his latest proposal

calls for benefits to be frozen at current salaries, a mixed bag of defined
benefit and 401k, and decreased cost of living raises for public employ-
ees across the state. It is unclear what affect his proposal will have on
Chicago Police pensions, if any. With the General Assembly still in ses-
sion, we are continuing to monitor the movement of any bills that involve
the pensions of our members. Senate Bill 777, which affords the City of
Chicago more time to actuarially fund our pension, passed both the
House and Senate. This bill calls for Chicago owned casino profits to
directly fund police and fire pensions. The PB&PA units did not support
this bill because the bill granting Chicago a casino license had not been
introduced. Without a dedicated revenue source in place to fund the
pensions, we could not agree to SB777. Basically the legislature put the
cart before the horse. We all know what follows the horses. Senate
President Cullerton called for a reconsideration of this bill and has not
sent it to the Governor. Hopefully a Chicago casino will be granted and
the journey to recovery for police and fire pensions can begin.

The department is planning on expanding the Body Worn Camera
Pilot Program in 014 to include Sergeants. We reached out to those ser-
geants that may be affected to gather their concerns so that we can

bring these issues to the attention of the department. They have not given us a date as to when the expansion will take place, but we want to have meaningful discussions about this with the department. The obvious questions that we have pertain to liability, discipline, and FOIA requests at this time. We'll update everyone when we have more information from the department.

The Association's 53rd Annual Golf Outing is right around the corner. If you haven't already, please round up your friends and reserve your foursome soon. Don't miss out on one of the best outings of the year.

The Chicago Police Sergeants Memorial should be completed by the end of August. All of the material has been ordered and the contractors hired. We will have a dedication ceremony shortly after the completion of the memorial. Thanks to the greatest membership there is for making this tribute a reality.

The arbitration for the "me-too" on the health insurance for age 55 retirees and the duty availability allowance was heard by Arbitrator Dan Nielson on June 19. The city made no argument as to the retro duty allowance and agreed to make that section of the contract whole. Both sides presented their arguments about the 2% contribution of retirees annuity for the health care upon retirement. Our point was as clear as our contract language on the issue. Add the fact that Fire Local 2 settled their grievance on the issue and do not have to contribute the 2% until FOP members do, we believe that we'll be successful in this grievance. Each side now has to file post-hearing briefs. We should hear something back from the arbitrator in about 90 days.

The second part of the lieutenant promotional exam was announced for August 29. We have asked about the results from part one of the test and were informed that no results are available yet, and that those who passed will be notified to attend on the 29th. Unfortunately, this has been how the city operates for a long time. From what I've been told by members who took the exam, those results could have been made available almost immediately as they were the typical scan-tron answer sheets. We will keep hounding the city for the results to be sent out. Best of luck to all who are taking the exam.

Lastly, be proud of the job that you are doing. Sometimes it can be a thankless one. Even though you may not realize it, you are making a difference by taking care of your people as best you can. Stay safe and enjoy the rest of the summer.

Vice-Presidents Report*By Paul Bilotta Vice-President*

I have received numerous calls regarding various arbitrations we have been involved in within the last several months. I would like to explain the arbitration process. Once we have made the decision to go to arbitration a demand for arbitration letter is sent to MLAS. Usually within several weeks the city attorney and our attorney will discuss available arbitrators to hear the case and then dates are discussed. After an arbitrator and a date have been selected the preparation process begins. The date could be anywhere from a few weeks depending on availability to four or more months away. After the arbitration takes place several things must happen. The court reporter generally has between fifteen and thirty days to get the transcripts submitted. The city attorney and our attorney will have between thirty and sixty days to get their briefs into the arbitrator. After all briefs have been submitted the arbitrator will now begin the process of reviewing the entire case, transcripts and the briefs. The arbitrator will usually have a remedy with ninety to one hundred twenty days from this point. As can be seen this is not a fast process nor does anything happen overnight. We currently have two outstanding arbitration cases that are of concern to the entire membership. The first case involves the Inspector General and the questioning of some of our members. We protested that this went beyond the scope of their authority, the city saw no wrong with these actions and we proceeded to arbitration for the ruling of a neutral third party. This case was heard on 01 June by Arbitrator Roumell. The second case which is certainly more near and dear to many is that of the 2% payment towards the medical upon retirement. This case was heard on 19 June by Arbitrator Nielsen. As soon as we get results on these two cases the membership will be notified.

Golf reservations as well raffle book sales to date are down this year from last year. This golf outing is held not only for all of us to get out and have some fun, but most importantly for the proceeds to be donated to the death benefit. This benefit belongs to each and every Sergeant in this department. If a Sergeant dies his beneficiary is presented with a check in the sum of \$5000.00. This check is usually given within the first few days of the Sergeant's death to assist the family with upcoming expenses. Please send in your raffle tickets. Please call to book your golf foursome or use the form which is printed in this newsletter. The only change from last year is that all payments must be made no later than Wednesday 5 August. Reservations will not be accepted after 5 August. Thank you for participating, we look forward to seeing everyone at this year's outing.

I appreciate all of our members and I am thankful for the fantastic group of women and men that we have the privilege of working with in this department. Take care of each other and be safe. Thank you for all that you do.

Pension Report*By Brian Wright Pension Board Representative*

Knowing this is a pivotal year for legislation regarding our pension fund because of the ARC payment due in 2016, the Board was waiting on what the City was going to try and pass. At the May Board Meeting, we discussed pending legislation that had been floated by the City. The first of the legislation was a “break” on the payment due in May 2016 and the subsequent payments thereafter. The second piece of legislation was a casino bill that as written would funnel all profits to the Police and Fire pension funds until each is 90% funded.

We all know that the City cannot afford the payments to all of the five pension funds in as the law stands in the next five years. That being said, the legislation for our fund is in place that states they must make the payment or have funds owed to the City from the State redirected into the fund. Unfortunately, those funds are not nearly enough to cover the shortfall if the City does not make its payment. All of these factors lead to the one conclusion that makes sense; we need additional and alternative revenue sources to fund the pensions. That is where the Casino bill comes in.

The City did not give the Board and their legal counsel much time to review and analyze the legislation before they needed an official position by the Board. However, the Board and its counsel reviewed the legislation with our financial analyst and outside pension experts. The conclusion was that the Casino bill is a win-win for us and the City. It gives us a dedicated revenue source without having to rely on the City. And, it relieves the City of a portion of their payment obligation on an annual basis.

So, wherein lies the rub you ask? Well, our position was that we support both bills only if they are passed together, or the Casino bill passes first. Well, as it stands, the payment relief bill passed both the House and Senate and awaits the governor’s signature. The PB&PA did not support this bill as a standalone. The Casino bill has been drafted, but not presented for passage, yet. The City and downstate legislators touted that the payment relief bill had union support. What they failed to mention is that the support was contingent on the Casino bill being passed first.

Our hired financial and political analyst has advised us that the ARC funding as it stands is destined to fail over time. The City simply cannot generate that much revenue to be able to pay all five pension funds and the general operating budget at the same time. What was suggested was an increased payment to around \$500 million per year (currently its around \$200 million per year), and a dedicated revenue source or sources, such as the Casino. The dedicated revenue source(s), the increase in the City’s payment and the investment returns on those new revenue payments should get us going in the right direction in the funded ratio.

As of this draft, the media is reporting that the governor is in favor of a Chicago casino to shore up the Police and Fire pension funds. The Mayor is in favor of this as well. They have already passed their payment relief legislation. If the Casino bill passes, at least we are heading in the right direction and not churning the same old issues. That is a big IF, and until it passes, the City has not shown they are willing to work with us. Have we been duped by the City again??? Only time will tell.....

Food for Thought

We have all found ourselves in this situation in life at one time or another. May it be at a party when all are dancing but you don't want to dance in case you were not blessed with grace and you think you will be laughed at. Or you might be in a class and you are asked to get up to speak but you are embarrassed because you might have a bit of a speech impairment. Or how about getting injured on duty and it changes your life forever, because you might not be able to do the physical things you were able to do. And then there are those of us that might not be as blessed as others with the talent or looks or family structure or finances, etc., etc. And how we handle our situation is strictly up to the person in the mirror. I met with an old friend who was seriously hurt in an accident, and after many months of physical rehab he returned to work. I asked him, "how did you have the courage and strength to keep on going, after having such a major setback in life"? I'll never forget his response. He said, "Rabbi, I can't turn the clock back and make a new beginning, but we ALL can start today and make a better ending". We hugged and shed a tear, he made me proud, because that is what life is all about. He brought to mind the story of "The King and The Precious Gem".....

"The Precious Gem"

There was once a great king who owned a precious gem, without peer compared to all gems in the world, in terms of size, color, clarity, and cut. It was a magnificent and precious stone. The king was so proud of his unique stone that every visiting dignitary who would visit would come see the stone, and would be very moved by its grandeur. On many occasions the king would go into his treasure vault and admire it privately. On one of these occasions when the king was privately viewing this stone, the gem fell from his hand and fell against some other stones, apparently even harder stones, for when he picked the gem up there was a gash on its face. The king was grief-stricken. He immediately called the royal jeweler who examined it and said based on his assessment, "Your Majesty, there is nothing I could do. I could cut the gem up or shave it down and it would be just as perfect but considerably smaller - this stone could never be of the same quality as it was." The king, unwilling to accept that his precious jewel would never be the same, continued calling other craftsmen and artisans who delivered the same verdict, to the king's great dismay. PB&PA of Illinois Lifetime Membership for Retirees

Upon retirement from the Chicago Police Department, a sergeants becomes a lifetime retired member of the Chicago Police Sergeants' Association and no further dues are collected. Retired members are welcome to all of the meetings and events of the Association. Your membership in our state organization, the Police Benevolent & Protective Association ends at the time of your retirement. If you would like to maintain your membership in the PB&PA and avail yourselves of the benefits of such membership, such as the death benefit, scholarship benefit, etc., consider the PB&PA Lifetime Membership. Lifetime members retain all of the benefits of being an active member, even after retirement. To become a lifetime member, you must have paid at least 20 years' dues. After 20 years, no further dues are necessary to maintain your membership. Since we, as CPSA, have only been members of the PB&PA since 1998, you have not been a member for 20 years. You may buy out the remaining years' dues at \$24.00 per year, which is half the normal rate for annual dues that were paid by the CPSA while you were active. For example, if upon retirement you have been a member for 12 years, you can buy out the remaining 8 years' dues for only \$192.00 to become a member for life. If you have retired and you would like to buy out your remaining dues to become a lifetime member, please contact Ms. Leah Petty at our state office in Springfield at anytime by phone at 217-523-5141 or by e-mail at office@pbpa.org.
